SPANISH MAJOR - Requirements for Native Spanish Speakers

Spanish native speakers are individuals who have relatively recently arrived in the US and/or have had extensive schooling in Spanish in Spanish- speaking countries. Native Spanish students who matriculate in Fall 2013 or thereafter must accumulate a total of **30 term hours of advanced courses to complete the Spanish major**. These ten courses must include:

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¹ Native speakers may take courses only from the 4000- and 5000-levels and should usually not take 4352, 4355 or 4358; exceptions will be made only for Study Abroad courses. Prerequisites vary by course.

² Native speakers of Spanish can take up to 6 hours of electives in courses related to Hispanic Studies that are offered in other departments: History, Anthropology, Human Rights, Art, Political Science, etc. These courses can be taught in English. Upon completion students are required to Force-Match these courses for the electives requirement with the Spanish Area Chair.
