PREPARING FOR COLLEGE MUSICIANSHIP STUDIES

Congratulations on your acceptance into the Music Division of the Meadows School of the Arts at Southern Methodist University! We in the Department of Music Theory and Composition look forward to working with you over the next four years in our music theory and musicianship courses. While all of your past musical experiences and activities have prepared you for embarking upon a rigorous college-level program for music majors, there are a few things that you can do to help smooth the transition to your college music studies. What follows is a brief outline and description of these things. It is possible you are already working on some of these. If not, a few weeks of preparation before you begin music theory studies will get you ready for the next stage of your musical training.

1. Get comfortable with your singing voice.

All musicians, whatever their specialties, are expected to be able to make music with their voices. We are not talking about traditional vocal training that leads to recital-quality singing. What we mean by being "comfortable with your singing voice" is the ability to sing pitches and rhythms accurately and in a relaxed manner. Singing is an important component of your required four-semester musicianship courses, so if you haven't done much singing in the past, now is the time to start.

Singing melodies of any kind and style is a good place to begin. In addition, it's a good idea to practice pitch matching in a wide variety of registers. For example, practice playing a pitch on your instrument or the keyboard and immediately singing it. Choose pitches not only in your own voice register, but in higher or lower registers. In singing these pitches, you will of course need to move them up or down one or perhaps several octaves to bring them into your

voice range. The ability to do this quickly and easily reflects the fact that you are truly "hearing" these pitches.

Be able to sing in tune the basic major and minor scales in one octave. Since much of your beginning musicianship studies is based on scales, being able to sing them accurately is an important skill.

Some of you, especially singers, may already have a background in solfege, that is, the application of syllables or numbers to notes within a key. This is a great preparation for college music studies; however, our courses do not necessarily assume this background. If you have not studied solfege before, the recommendations above will still help you achieve a level of vocal competence that will help you do well in your courses.

2. Review the fundamentals of music theory.

By "fundamentals," we mean scales, key signatures, intervals, triads, rhythm, and meter. You may have studied many or all of these things with private teachers or in school courses. Now is a good time to review these materials in preparation for the placement tests you will take before the start of the fall semester. These tests, based on theory fundamentals, will place you in a section of our courses suitable to your background and ability.

At this point in your studies, scales and key signatures are perhaps the most crucial of fundamentals. There are several things you can do in these areas during the weeks before the start of courses. Memorizing all the major and minor key signatures is a good place to start. Since all musicians learn to play scales on their primary instrument, it's also a good idea to use this ability to help you deepen your knowledge of scales. As you play scales on your instrument, visualize the placement of the notes on the staff and think of their names. This helps to connect the *how* of playing your instrument with the awareness of *what* you are actually playing.

3. If you haven't studied the piano or organ before, at least begin getting familiar with the keyboard.

Part of your musicianship training will be developing basic technique on the keyboard, which you can then use as a tool in the further development of your skills. All entering students will have the option to be tested by the Class Piano department to determine advanced placement in the class piano sequence. (Information on the piano placement requirements is attached.) If your primary instrument is not the piano or organ, and you've never had any keyboard training before, there are still some things you can do to prepare for your college music courses.

Know the names of the notes on the keyboard and their notation in the bass and treble clefs. You can easily practice this by taking any piece of music and quickly finding individual notes on the keyboard. When you practice matching pitches vocally at the keyboard, think of the note names before singing them. Playing scales is another way to become familiar with the keyboard. Slowly playing a major or minor scale (precise fingerings are not important at this stage) while reciting the note names will not only give you keyboard practice but will also go a long way toward training your ear and reinforcing your knowledge of music fundamentals. Depending on your prior training, you can also practice playing intervals and basic triads (major, minor, diminished, augmented) with one hand.

Any or all of the things mentioned above, with a very small investment of time, will help you lay the foundation for success in your theory and musicianship courses and in the future development of your musical skills.

Housing. Residence Halls open on Saturday, August 22, 2015 (First-Year students move in Aug. 19).

All new students are required to participate in a large ensemble (Choir, Orchestra, or Wind Ensemble). If you play an instrument that is not included in one of these ensembles, sign up for the choral placement hearing for non-voice majors on Sunday, August 23, 2:00-3:30PM (bulletin board by the Choral Hall rm.1180; see the attached orientation schedule).

Choral placement for non-voice majors and non-music majors. Approximately five minutes will be provided to each person for vocalization, sight-reading, and each student should be ready to sing a prepared solo (accompanist provided). Non-majors can sing a hymn or "America the Beautiful" instead of a prepared solo. Sign up for a choral placement hearing on Sunday, August 23 (bulletin board by the Choral Hall rm.1180).

Class Piano Placement. Students who have had two years or less of formal piano study are not required to take a placement examination. They should enroll for PERB 1131. Students who have had two or more years of formal piano study may test for placement into 2nd, 3rd, or 4th semester piano and to receive credit by examination. Please see separate document "Class Piano Requirements and Testing."

Instrumental Students are expected provide **music stands** for use in chamber music ensembles or outside jobs. The Division of Music furnishes music stands for major ensemble rehearsals and performances. If you do not own a portable metal stand, purchase one now and bring it for personal use.

Ensemble Registration. Even though the auditions for Meadows Wind Ensemble, Meadows Symphony Orchestra, and Meadows Choral Ensembles take place late during orientation week and early the first week of classes, your registration will not be delayed. All string students enroll in Symphony Orchestra and all brass and woodwind students enroll in Wind Ensemble and Symphony Orchestra. Saxophonists enroll in Wind Ensemble and Jazz Orchestra. Percussionists enroll in Percussion Ensemble, Wind Ensemble, and Symphony Orchestra. All vocalists enroll in concert choir and may be assigned to Meadows Chorale dependent upon your audition. Pianists and guitarists typically enroll in Concert Choir. Ensemble directors will advise you on the process of any add/drops that are deemed necessary after the auditions.

First-year undergraduate students enroll for MUAS 1020: Music Pathways, a **required** course meeting Fridays 1:00-1:50 pm in the Choral Hall (OAC 1180) in lieu of required recital attendance.

New Graduate students (MM & PD) in music are **required** to attend an orientation/reception in the Taubman Atrium, Wednesday, August 19 at 5:00 pm prior to the theory diagnostic testing.

Piano Requirements for Degrees in Music (All undergraduate music degrees include a piano requirement.)

B.M. degrees in Performance, Composition, Music Education and Therapy require a total of four credits of class piano. For students with less than two years of formal piano study prior to college, this is normally satisfied with PERB 1131, 1132, 2131, and 2132 – four one-hour courses taken in each of the first four semesters at SMU. Keyboard majors and students in other music majors that have extensive pre-college keyboard background normally enroll for PERB 1233 and 1234 – two two-hour courses taken in either the second or third year at SMU.

The **B.A.** degree in Music requires two credits of class piano – PERB 1131 and 1132 or PERB 2131 and 2132 according to proficiency or placement exam. B.A. students with a piano concentration may satisfy this requirement by taking PERB 1233 or 1234.

The **Minor in Music** does not require class piano or a piano proficiency.

Testing and Placement: Saturday, August 22, 2:00-4:00 pm, OFAC B030 (Dr. Karp's Studio) Please email Professor Gunter at kgunter@smu.edu to schedule a placement appointment time.

Prospective music majors with <u>less than two years of formal piano study</u> should enroll for PERB 1131 in their first semester at SMU. There is no need to be tested.

Prospective music majors with two years or more of formal piano study may be individually tested for advanced placement in Class Piano, academic credit, and/or a waiver of the Class Piano requirement.

Students wishing to be tested for exemption from PERB 1131 should prepare the following items:

- 1) Piano solo at the level of a L. Mozart minuet (memory not required)
- 2) All major scales two octaves ascending and descending hands separately
- 3) Major and minor triads and inversions on any tonic
- 4) Primary triad progression in keyboard voicing in any major key

In addition, students will be asked to **sight-read and transpose** material at appropriate level and to supply a **harmonization** for a given diatonic melody using primary triads.

Students wishing to be exempted from PERB 1132 should prepare the same items, plus:

- 1) All minor scales two octaves ascending and descending hands alone
- 2) All major scales two octaves ascending and descending hands together
- 3) Five qualities of seventh chords on any tonic
- 4) Progressions of diatonic triads that include primary and secondary harmonies (e.g. I vi IV V I)

In addition, students will be asked to **sight-read and transpose** material at appropriate level and to supply a **harmonization** for a given diatonic melody using primary and secondary triads.

Students wishing to be exempted from PERB 2131 should prepare:

- 1) Piano solo of the level of a J.S. Bach minuet
- 2) Major and harmonic minor scales two octaves ascending and descending hands together
- 3) Chord progressions that include any primary or secondary harmony in minor (e.g. I VI IV ii6 i6/4 V7 I)
- 4) Construct and play secondary dominants of any scale degree in any major key

In addition, students will be asked to **sight read** material at the level of a L. Mozart minuet, **transpose** the same material at sight and supply a **harmonization** for a given diatonic melody that includes 7th chords and secondary harmonies indicated by Roman numerals.

Piano performance majors and concentrations **are not required** to take a placement examination. After advising, they will in enroll in PERB 1233/1234 during the 2^{nd} or 3^{rd} year of study.

The following information is provided so you may purchase required concert attire before coming to campus. Remember that the purpose of "concert black" is to blend into the ensemble – not to "stand out" from the crowd. Men may want to consider purchasing a tuxedo from a rental warehouse. These are rented less than six times on the average before being sold to the public at greatly discounted prices.

Choral Concert Attire

Women – Attire must be all black and floor-length (either skirts, dresses, or formal pants). Tops should have no plunging necklines and sleeves should be no shorter than 3/4 length. Wear small earrings, no necklaces, and black shoes that will not make noise while moving around on stage.

Men – Black dress pants (may be tuxedo pants; no jeans), black long-sleeved collared dress shirt (no polos, no t-shirts), black belt with simple buckle. Black shoes and socks.

Orchestra Concert Attire

Men -Evening concerts: black tuxedo or black suit (NO navy or charcoal or any other color) with white shirt and black bow tie, black socks, black dress shoes

Afternoon concerts: black suit, white shirt, conservative long tie, black socks, black dress shoes

Women - Evening concerts: conservative long black dress or black top and black dress pants. Sleeves must be below the elbow. Black hose. Black dress shoes.

Afternoon concerts: As above, or dress may be "T" length (mid-calf - below the knee).

Wind Ensemble Concert Attire

Men - black tuxedo or black suit with white shirt and black bow tie, black socks, black dress shoes. ["All Black": Black long-sleeve shirt, black dress pants, black socks, black dress shoes]

Women - conservative long black dress or black top and black dress pants. Sleeves must be below the elbow. Black hose. Black dress shoes.
