DM 9346 Urban Ministry: Contexts and Strategies

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Description

An examination of the contexts and strategies appropriate for urban ministry in the 21st century. Focus will be on models for understanding the relationships between congregation and community in cities, but attention also will be given to broader national and global forces operating in specific urban settings.

Objectives

- 1. To understand the impact of the urban context on the form and function of churches.
- 2. To think carefully about the meaning of the biblical injunction to "love our neighbor: and to "seek the Welfare of the city."
- 3. To identify productive models of urban ministry.
- 4. To enhance skills of investigation and research in urban ministry
