## REDEFINING THE FRONT LINE: CIVILIANS IN THE FIRST WORLD WAR

Historians have often described World War I as the first, modern total war. As such, one of the innovative features of this conflict was that its widespread use of modern technology challenged war's geographic limits. Where was 'the front' when poison gas drifted beyond the battlefield or airplanes dropped bombs on city streets? This talk explores the impact of several modes of warfare on civilian populations and thus on the borders between 'home front' and 'front line'.

Susan R. Grayzel is Professor of History and Director of the Sarah Isom Center for Women and Gender Studies at the University of Mississippi. She researches and teaches about culture, gender and the world wars in national, European, and global contexts. Her books include Women's Identities At War: Gender, Motherhood, and Politics in Britain and France during the First World War (1999), awarded the NACBS British Council Prize; Women and the First World War (2002); The First World War: A Brief History with Documents (2012) and At Home and Under Fire: Air Raids and Culture in Britain from the Great War to the Blitz (2012).
