It will also explore how different aspects of hunter-gatherer ecology can be identified in the archaeological record.

ANTH 6390/4350 CURRENT ISSUES IN ANTHROPOLOGY – THE DEVELOPMENT OF SOCIAL COMPLEXITY IN MESOAMERICA. This seminar is an investigation of the archaeological cultures in Mesoamerica (which includes southern Mexico, Guatemala, Belize, and western Honduras) from the earliest inhabitants of the region through the emergence of civilization. Theoretical issues covered include the peopling of Mesoamerica, emergence of agriculture, the transition to sedentary villages as well as the origins of sociopolitical complexity and the first states.
