Recent books include: Politics of Public Space (with Neil Smith), Rethinking Urban Parks: Public Space and Cultural Diversity (with S. Scheld and D. Taplin), Behind the Gates: Life, Security and the Pursuit of Happiness in Fortress America, and On the Plaza: The Politics of Public Space and Culture. She is currently

researching (with R. Lippert) how private governance of condominiums in New York City and Toronto impacts social relations; this project is funded by the Canadian Social Sciences Research Council. She is also writing a book entitled <u>Spatializing Culture</u>: An Anthropological Theory of Space and Place.
