



Joshua Taylor is the Instructor of Sacred Music Studies in the University of North Texas College of Music and serves as the Director of Worship & Music at First United Methodist Church in Denton, Texas. He holds the Doctor of Pastoral Music degree from the Perkins School of Theology/SMU, a Master of Music in Choral Conducting from Kansas State University, and a Bachelor's of Music Education from the University of North Texas. He previously served as the Community Musician for the Iona Community in Scotland and as the Director of Worship & Music at First Presbyterian Church in Dallas, Texas.

Jose Luis Manrique is a Peruvian composer and conductor based in Brazil since 2012. He holds a Bachelor's of Composition and Conducting degree from the Universidade Estadual do Paraná (UNESPAR - Curitiba I), a Master's of Theology degree from the Pontifícia Universidade Católica do Paraná (Pontifical Catholic University of Paraná). He is the music producer of the Coro e Orquestra Arquidiocesanos Luz dos Pinhais (Archdiocesan Choir and Orchestra), visiting professor of the postgraduate course in Liturgical Music at the Universidade Salesiana em São Paulo (Salesian University in São Paulo), and member of the Ars Iubilorum composers collective. Nowadays, Manrique is pursuing a Doctor of Theology degree at the Pontifícia Universidade Católica do Paraná and is a visiting scholar in the Doctor of Pastoral Music program at SMU, Dallas, TX.

PREACHING AND CONFLICT TRANSFORMATION

TUESDAY, APRIL 16 9:00 AM – 3:30 PM IN PROTHRO GREAT HALL

Conflict is a normal part of life. Our neighborhoods, congregations, and workplaces experience conflict. Conflict can be a generative part of sanctification for individuals and communities who are growing in faithfulness, but at times conflict can spiral into pain, broken relationships, squandering of resources, and violence as is evidenced by estranged families, polarized politics, denominational splits, and wars raging in Ukraine and Israel/Gaza.

Because the stakes are so high, preachers often feel powerless amid conflict and may avoid speaking about or engaging conflict from the pulpit. But there is a path forward, this event will focus on how preachers can embrace tools, wisdom, and approaches from the field of conflict transformation to bring peace, new life, and hope to congregations and communities.

SAMUEL WESLEY, father of John and Charles, is credited by many resources as a clergyman, writer, and poet. Indeed, he published his first volume of poetry in 1685 following his graduation from Oxford University. What many people fail to mention about Samuel, however, is just how awful a poet he was. His book, entitled *Maggots: or, Poems on Several Subjects Never Before Handled*, contains such captivating poems as "On a Supper of Stinking Ducks," and "A Tame Snake Left in a Box of Bran Was Devoured by a Mouse after a Great Battle." Contestants wishing to refer to Wesley's work will find online copies through the ProQuest One Literature Database or Early English Books Online.

The winning entries will be exhibited in Bridwell Library, alongside the first edition of *Maggots*, between May and September, 2024. They will also be preserved in Bridwell Library's Samuel Wesley Bad Poetry Archive and may be published at a later date.
