*Course Description* This course presents an overview of the development of amateur and professional athletics over the course of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries in the United States. Class lectures will include excerpts from sports documentaries so as to bring the history of American sport to life: we will see innings from early baseball games, the rough and tumble of football, and the feats of boxers within the ring, as well as other triumphs and struggles. We will take two field trips: to Rangers Stadium in Arlington to see an afternoon game and to AT&T Stadium in Arlington where we will take a guided tour.

Assigned Reading The following book is available for purchase from the SMU bookstore & from on-line booksellers: Richard Davies' Sports in American Life (2<sup>nd</sup> edition, 2011).

*Field Trips:* We will take two field trips, which will cost students \$45, payable to the instructor. This fee will cover the cost of tickets for a Rangers baseball game and the price of a VIP tour of AT&T Stadium.

*Evaluation & Expectations* The course grade will be based on class discussion, a PPT presentation about an athlete or sporting event, quiz grades, and the final exam. Students are expected to come to class prepared. Attendance is required. The University's policies do not excuse absences due to illness, travel, family or other personal reasons. ### Student Learning Outcomes Historical Contexts – Level I

- Students will be able to identify the main events, actors, and evidence involved in sports in the United States during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.
- Students will be able to summarize in their own prose the major changes in sports that took place over time during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

# Philosophical and Religious Inquiry and Ethics -- Level II

- Students will critically reflect on and apply some of the theoretical methods germane to the fields of ethics and religious studies.
- Students will learn about the relationship between established faith traditions and sports, considering when and how sports were partners with faith traditions and when and how sports assumed the shape of civil religion in the United States.

#### Human Diversity

- With respect to issues related to race, ethnicity, and gender students will be able to demonstrate an understanding of the historical, cultural, social, and political conditions of identity formation within the broad context of sports.
- Students will learn about how race, ethnicity and gender influenced individual and group status, treatment, and accomplishments within particular sports.
