



Dr. **Greta Swain** received her PhD from George Mason University. She specializes in early American history and digital history. Greta's book project Potomac Networks: Waterways, Commerce, and Enslavement in the George Mason Family, 1700–1828 presents a new approach to the study of the Mason family by employing digital analysis and visualizations. Her dissertation has been described as "a masterclass in how to use digital methods for historical interpretation."

Greta is co-editor of <u>Current Research in Digital History</u>, an online, peer reviewed, open access journal that she helped create in 2018. From 2017–2021, she was a Digital History Fellow and collaborator at the Roy Rosenzweig Center for History and New Media. Her public history experience includes work at several museums and the Smithsonian Institute Archives.

...ROSS PEROT SR.

The Perot Foundation has entrusted CPH with the task of building a digital archive of oral histories that illuminate the life, career, and politics of H. Ross Perot, Sr., along with the most important technological and business advances and political developments of the 20th century. Director **Jeffrey Engel** has so far conducted more than 30 interviews, with more to come. As the H. Ross Perot Sr. postdoctoral fellow, **Camille Davis** is assisting Dr. Engel with conducting the interviews, overseeing the transcription process, and managing the data collection and technology for this project.

...OBAMA'S PRESIDENCY

Former postdoctoral fellow **Evan McCormick** leads an interdisciplinary team at Columbia University creating an oral history archive about the Obama presidency. They recently released transcripts related to Obama's policies on the environment and climate change, which are now available at https://obamaoralhistory.columbia.edu/. The launch received wide media coverage. Evan himself has conducted 90 interviews with decisionmakers and diplomats here and abroad about Obama's global policies. Check it out as the archive continues to grow.

...PEPFAR

Along with Associate Professor of History Jill Kelly and postdoctoral fellow Augusta Dell'Omo, Associate Director Brian Franklin secured competitive funding from SMU and the George W. Bush Institute for two postdoctoral fellowships to support a new collaborative project: "A Global Oral History of PEPFAR." The project seeks to document the global health program launched during Bush's presidency by recording interviews with US policymakers and others who implemented and experienced the program worldwide. It will initially focus on the southern African continent.

...GEORGE MASON


Greta Swain is set to publish an original dataset about the individuals who were enslaved by the George Mason family in the Chesapeake region over the course of 125 years. The dataset documents more than 850 mentions of enslaved individuals between 1700 and 1825 and draws on a range of sources including Mason family wills, inventories, deeds of sale, and runaway ads in newspapers. The dataset aims to help other scholars and the public better understand the lives, experiences and forced migration of these individuals over time.

almost Off the Press

Augusta Dell'Omo's book manuscript, Saving Apartheid: White Supremacist Internationalism at the Cold War's End, is under contract with Columbia **University Press**

University of North Carolina Press is set to publish The Life and Death of Ryan White, a second book by former postdoctoral fellow **Paul Renfro**, in Fall 2024 or Spring 2025.

Former postdoctoral fellow Cecily Zander will have her book, The Army Under Fire: Antimilitarism in the Civil War Era (Louisiana State University Press), hit all good bookstores by February 2024.



OTHER WRITINGS

Former postdoctoral fellow **Sharron Conrad** has published an article "More Upset Than Most: Measuring and Understanding African American Responses to the Kennedy Assassination," in the June 2023 issue of American Quarterly.

Jeffrey Engel contributed a co-authored chapter (with Frank Costigliola), "Reconstructing the Backstory: America, Russia, and the Cold War," to a volume, Thinking Otherwise: How Walter LaFeber Explained the History of US Foreign Relations, to be published by Cornell University Press next year. Another chapter, "Personalities and Power at the Cold War's End," will appear in Locating the Transatlantic in 20th Century Politics, Diplomacy, and Culture (Bloomsbury).



A chapter, "Grant Funded Research and Graduate Student Success," co-written by postdoctoral fellow Amanda Regan, will appear in Digital Futures of Graduate Study in the Humanities (University of Minnesota Press).

Former postdoctoral fellow **Tim Sayle** has published the article, "Indications of War: American, British and Canadian Intelligence Diplomacy and the 1957 Tripartite Intelligence Alerts Agreement," in a recent issue of Intelligence & National Security.

"Whither The Radicals?," an article by **Cecily Zander**, appears in Reviews in American History (March 2023).

Summer Travel

World War I Tour: An American Journey through "The Great War" June 1-10, 2023

Jeffrey Engel and Essential History Expeditions' Brian DeToy led a spectacular and engaging examination of Belgium and France through the lens of World War I. For students, alumni, and friends, this intergenerational tour offered an in-depth exploration of America's role in The Great War in the cities and on the fields where history took place.



Sharing Research & Expertise

Current and former CPH fellows took active part in numerous professional conferences across the country and beyond. Others were invited to deliver guest lectures. Among them, Senior Fellow **Paul Behringer** presented a talk at the University of Maryland, drawing on material in his forthcoming book on the Russian Civil War. **Jeffrey Engel** taught a weeklong K-12 teacher seminar on "US Foreign Policy since 1898" for the Gilder Lehrman Institute and Richard Nixon Presidential Library during the summer.

CPH created a strong presence at the Society for Historians of American Foreign Relations (SHAFR) annual conference in Washington DC in June. It sponsored a roundtable titled "SHAFR and Presidential History: An Assessment," which brought together **Paul Behringer** (organizer), postdoctoral fellow **Jonathan Ng** (moderator), postdoctoral fellow **Ashlyn Hand**, **LaiYee Leong**, and former postdoctoral fellow **Kaete O'Connell**. The panelists discussed their diverse approaches to presidential history, highlighting the range of methods and topics that it encompasses. In addition, **Jonathan Ng** and **Augusta Dell'Omo** separately delivered individual papers on other panels.

Greg Brew is an analyst covering Iran and the geopolitics of energy at Eurasia Group.

Carolyn Levy is Instructional Consultant for Equity and Inclusion within the Center for Teaching and Learning at the University of Washington.

Sarah Nelson is Assistant Professor of History and International Studies at Leiden University.

Cecily Zander is Assistant Professor of History at Texas Woman's University.

The Dedman College Interdisciplinary Institute renewed funding for the third time to support **LaiYee Leong**'s research cluster on Asian Studies and Asian American Experiences (co-convened with two faculty colleagues). The cluster seeks to introduce critical Asian American perspectives into research and teaching. Last April, it hosted the first ever symposium at SMU centered on an Asian American theme.

Jonathan Ng won a William and Madeline Welder Smith Research Travel Award, which supports his research at the Dolph Briscoe Center for American History in Austin, Texas. Jonathan will review the papers of sociologist and peace activist C. Wright Mills, as well as the archives of Congressman Henry González, who oversaw a seminal investigation of the arms industry.

The Social Science and Humanities Research Council recently awarded **Tim Sayle** a major grant for the study of nuclear weapons policy during the Cold War. Tim just completed a manuscript on allied intelligence efforts during the early Cold War and is sharing recently declassified documents through a free newsletter at http://timsayle.substack.com.

ENGAGEMENT

Former postdoctoral fellow **Greg Brew** appeared on CNBC's Last Call with Brian Sullivan to in June to discuss Iran's booming oil exports. He has also been interviewed on podcasts such as *American Prestige*, *History as it Happens* (*The Washington Times*), and *Barron's Live. Foreign Policy, TIME*, and Barron's have all recently published some of Greg's writings.

Zach Conn is serving as a researcher and adviser for a proposed PBS documentary on Native American history since 1880.

The 60th anniversary of JFK's assassination means opportunities for CPH's scholars to share their professional insights. A new History Channel documentary, *Kennedy*, will include **Sharron Conrad** and **Jeffrey Engel**. The eightpart series will broadcast in November. Sharron will also be the featured speaker at the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library's "Kennedy Library Forum."

Augusta Dell'Omo was recently interviewed for *The Washington Post*'s report, "Study: At all levels of public office, threats now come with the job."

Postdoctoral fellow **Jonathan Ng** contributed two articles to the journal Truthout: "US Economic War on Venezuela Has Rewarded Corruption and Undermined Democracy," and "Peace in Ukraine Is Too Important to Leave in the Hands of Arms Dealers."

As interest in the digital humanities continues to explode, **Amanda Regan** remains at its forefront. She was interviewed for a report by Ithaka S + R on <u>Data Sharing in the Humanities</u>. She also got time on *The Atlas Obscura Podcast* in July to talk about *Mapping the Gay Guides*.

Paul Renfro contributed an essay, "Pinning the Rise of Neoliberalism on Ronald Reagan Lets Democrats Off Easy," to *Jacobin* over the summer. In addition, he was interviewed for a story in *Slate* about Soul Asylum's classic music video for the song "Runaway Train."

With NATO in the news, **Tim Sayle** has been offering commentary to many local and global news outlets. In <u>a podcast by Globe & Mail</u>, he explains the history and tension between the security alliance and Russia and tells us what NATO expansion reveals about the state of world affairs.

CSPAN viewers will catch **Cecily Zander** next month as she delivers a talk on Braxton Bragg and the Civil War in 1863.

A chat with

Dr. Amy Zanoni

Former postdoctoral fellow Amy Zanoni talks to CPH intern Tamal Pilla.

How has your postdoc experience at CPH helped prepare you for your current position?

The CPH gave me space and support to make progress on my research and establish myself as a scholar by publishing work, connecting with other historians, and more. While at the CPH I also gained crucial public history experience — for example, through organizing and hosting public events and speaking on the CPH podcast. I draw on all of this experience in my current position as the executive director of a nonprofit organization

that builds community through public humanities and arts programming, and also when continuing to write for academic and public audiences.

What spurred your love of history in general?

My love of history is rooted in my desire to understand our world and, especially, inequality. What policy decisions and commitments got us here? I am also very interested in the many alternatives people have envisioned — health care and social welfare systems that look different from those in place today.

What are you reading right now?

Well, I just finished re-reading *Moby Dick*. I recommend! Now I am reading two books, one fiction and one non-fiction. The fiction is *Perma Red* by Debra Magpie Earling, a novel that takes place on the Flathead Reservation in western Montana. I recently heard the author read from the book, which just came out in a new edition (after being out of print for quite a while). I'm about a quarter of the way through and really loving it. I also just started *All Health Politics Is Local* by historian Merlin Chowkwanyun, a professor at Columbia University's Mailman School of Public Health. I have been eagerly awaiting the publication of this book, which casts U.S. health care as profoundly local. Up next in my history reading cue are Joan Flores-Villalobos's *The Silver Women*, Melanie Newport's *This Is My Jail*, and Keith Wailoo's *Pushing Cool*.
