

JAN EDGAR LANGBEIN

Jan Edgar Langbein is a community activist - and a champion of women. For more than 28 years, her personal mission has been to end violence against women. Serving as CEO of Genesis Women's Shelter and Support in Dallas, Texas, she oversees the internal and external operations of a full service/critical response for victims of violence. In 2008, she was appointed by President George W. Bush to serve as Senior Policy Advisor to the U.S. Department of Justice's Office on Violence Against Women



(OVW). She is a national spokesperson on the epidemic of violence that now affects one in three people. Jan is a recognized expert, and she is a frequent speaker at national conferences, universities, civic groups and businesses across the globe. She provides expert testimony in court cases and trains law enforcement, as well as prosecutorial professionals. Partnering with the Dallas Police Department, she co-founded the International Conference on Crimes Against Women.

Jan has received numerous awards, including the FBI Director's Community Leadership Award, Mosaic Family Services Champion of Human Rights Award and the Texas Women's Foundation Maura Award. She holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Texas Tech University. At SMU, our annual Women's Symposium was proud to honor Jan with the Profiles in Leadership Community Award in 2003. We welcomed her as a speaker for TEDxSMUWomen in 2016, and she contributed to a Dedman Law School report on family violence in 2017. Last month, Jan received the George W. Bush Institute Trailblazer Citation from Mrs. Laura Bush – as part of the Institute's Annual Forum on Leadership. This award honors an outstanding leader who has effected change and enriched the quality of life in the North Texas region. Her daughter, Sarah Langbein Lee, earned a bachelor of music degree in voice performance from SMU in 2002.

THE SMU MCKENZIE BIBLE

The McKenzie Bible was printed in 1856 and once was the property of J.W.P. McKenzie, a pioneer in Methodist education in Texas. It was used continually by McKenzie, who established McKenzie College at Clarksville, once the largest institution of higher learning

in Texas. This historic Bible was presented to SMU in 1916 by Mrs. Milton Ragsdale of Dallas, a niece of McKenzie.

The McKenzie Bible was first used at SMU's 1916 Commencement Convocation, and the University is proud to use it at tonight's Baccalaureate Service.
