The 2023 RASC/a Art History Graduate Student Conference at SMU will address the broad theme of "copied" art, including art and visual culture which has been produced in multiples, reenacted, or appropriated. Pushing against the idea of artwork as singular, static, and unique, "Copy and Paste" interrogates how artworks are repeated and replicated, embracing forms of art-making sometimes marginalized by the art historical canon. From molded miniatures of the Hellenistic period to twentieth-century editioned artist books, "Copy and Paste" hopes to open a space for discussions of the complex interrelationships between these autonomous objects, given their potential dispersal throughout time, geography, and context. We encourage papers that are interdisciplinary in nature and welcome discussions of all time periods, geographic locations, and mediums. Possible topics include, but are not limited to:
