- A. Full-time teaching and scholarship in the history of Christianity, with particular attention to Methodist/Wesleyan Studies.
  - 1. Teaching courses in the various degree programs of Perkins School of Theology and in the M.A. and Ph.D. curricula of the Graduate Program in Religious Studies of Southern Methodist University.
  - 2. Scholarship, including publications, in the field of appointment.
- B. Participation in the life and work of Perkins School of Theology, the Graduate Program in Religious Studies, and other parts of Southern Methodist University, including the structures of governance, exercising the responsibilities normally assumed by faculty members.

### Minimum qualifications

- A. Ph.D. or equivalent degree.
- B. Demonstrated achievement or promise as a scholar and teacher in the field of the history of Christianity.
- C. Demonstrated achievement or promise as a scholar and teacher in the field of the history of Methodist/Wesleyan traditions in their many varieties, with knowledge of The United Methodist Church, its present situation, structures, and concerns.
- D. Commitment to the primary objectives both of Perkins School of Theology to prepare persons for leadership in the church and in various forms of Christian ministry, and of the Graduate Program in Religious Studies to prepare persons for leadership in the academy.
- E. Commitment to teaching in all the degree programs of Perkins School of Theology and the Graduate Program in Religious Studies, and in all approved modes of instruction (including in-person, online, and hybrid).
- F. Commitment to working in a religiously and theologically diverse and pluralistic community.
- G. Lay or clergy membership in The United Methodist Church.

### Preferred qualifications:

- A. Knowledge of the contemporary contexts and concerns of Methodist/Wesleyan traditions in their many varieties.
- B. Knowledge of current theoretical debates in the study of culture and history.
- C. Knowledge of inter-religious and intercultural contexts and conflicts.
- D. Background, interests, perspectives, and abilities that complement those of other members of the faculty, with an openness to creative pedagogical and academic collaboration across disciplines.
