# Road to R-1: Research and Scholarly/Creative Excellence

#### **Update on Proposals for FY 2024 Congressional Earmark/Appropriation Process**

Thank you to our faculty for a strong response to this fall's call for proposals for consideration as a part of the U.S. Congress' FY 2024 earmark and/or appropriations process.

First draft proposals were due November 23, 2023, to be eligible for consideration and today is the final submission deadline. As of this morning, we had received 37 proposals. <u>Suku Nair</u>, Vice Provost for Research and Chief Innovation Officer. Suku and I will review these proposals next week to make final determinations with hopes of putting forward 20 proposals for consideration at the federal level.

#### SMU to open new Institute for Computational Biosciences at Pegasus Park

SMU will open its new Institute for Computational Biosciences at Pegasus Park, as also reported by <u>Dallas Morning</u> <u>News</u> and <u>Dallas Innovates</u>. Our Pegasus Park location will give students and faculty members the opportunity to interact with others at the biotech hub.
