Fall 2022

Executive Board Meetings this Week

This week, President Turner, Vice President for Development and External Affairs Brad Cheves and I joined Dean Jason Nance in a meeting with the Dedman School of Law's executive board.

Dedman School of Law

I updated board members on SMU's – and Dedman Law's – recent accomplishments toward greater academic excellence and provided introductions of our newest deans – Jason Nance, Judge James Noel Dean of the Dedman School of Law, and Robin Poston, Dean of the Moody School of Graduate and Advanced Studies and Associate Provost for Graduate Education. I concluded with an update on our search for a new dean of the Lyle School of Engineering.

Responding to the Power Outage this Week

During the late evening of November 1, issues with an off-campus power transformer caused a widespread power outage that impacted most campus buildings. ONCOR reported the transformer's issues to SMU. SMU canceled morning classes and briefly delayed the start of the workday as crews worked to restore power to campus facilities. Power was restored at approximately 8:30 a.m., employees began reporting for work shortly thereafter and all classes resumed at 12:30 p.m. SMU is still working through after-event issues with ONCOR to determine causes and review actions.

This week's power outage gave us an opportunity to test SMU's updated decision-making and communication protocols in response to adverse events and inclement weather. As a reminder during these types of situations, you will receive email and text updates via SMU Aware and are also encouraged to consult the SMU Aware website for the most current information. Thanks again for your flexibility and understanding in response to these adverse events.

Moody School Three-Minute Thesis Competition November 14

SMU graduate students will present their research and compete for prizes at this year's Three Minute Thesis (3MT) competition, which will take place on Monday, November 14, from 12:00 - 1:30 pm, in the Chamber in the Hughes-Trigg Student Center (lower level). 3MT celebrates the exciting research being conducted by SMU graduate students and allows them to hone their communication and presentation skills.

The rules of the competition are simple: participants present their dissertation or thesis research in non-specialist language in less than three minutes with the assistance of one static PowerPoint slide. They are judged on the effectiveness of their presentation and their ability to convince the judges of the impact of their research. All members of the SMU community are invited to attend. Lunch will be served starting at 11:45 am. Attendees are invited to pick up lunch and take a seat before the competition gets started at 12 pm.
