Fall 2022

Executive Board Meetings this Week

This week, President Turner, Vice President for Development and External Affairs Brad Cheves, and I joined Deans Holland and DiPiero in meetings with their units' executive boards.

Meadows School of the Arts

For this meeting, I updated board members on SMU's – and Meadows' – recent accomplishments toward greater academic excellence and provided introductions of our newest deans – Jason Nance, Judge James Noel Dean of the Dedman School of Law, and Robin Poston, Dean of the Moody School of Graduate and Advanced Studies and Associate Provost for Graduate Education. I concluded with an update on our search for a new dean of the Lyle School of Engineering.

Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences

For this meeting, I updated board members on SMU's – and Dedman College's – recent accomplishments in two of our four priority areas for academic affairs: 1) academic excellence and 2) research excellence. I concluded my remarks by introducing Deans Nance and Poston and providing a status update for our next dean of the Lyle School of Engineering.

In a luncheon following the meeting, SMU <u>announced</u> a \$5M gift from Liz and Bill Armstrong to endow and name the dean position for the Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences. This historic gift will provide permanent funding for the academic leader of Dedman College, and Dean Tom DiPiero will serve as the inaugural Elisabeth Martin Armstrong Dean of Dedman College.

Wesley Theological Seminary, in partnership with SMU's Perkins School of Theology, Receives \$5M Lilly Grant to Expand Pathways to Ministry

This week, it was announced that Wesley Theological Seminary and the Perkins School of Theology would collaborate to develop new non-degree courses and certificates for pastors with the support of a \$5 million grant from Lilly Endowment, Inc. The grant, part of the third and final phase of Lilly's Pathways for Tomorrow Initiative, will allow both schools to develop a business model to better support comprehensive theological education: layered and articulated courses and programs that reach and serve pastors and lay ministers throughout their ministries and across many contexts.

Simmons Faculty Compares Performance Gap Between Male and Female Runners

New research from Peter Weyand, Glenn Simmons, Endowed Professor in Applied Physiology and Biomechanics in the Simmons School of Education and Human Development's Department of Applied Physiology and Sport Management, and Ph.D. student Emily McClelland compares the performance gap between male and female runners in an article published recently in <u>Outside Magazine</u>. They found the performance gap is narrower in short sprints than in endurance events.
