

Spring 2023

On Wednesday, we <u>announced</u> Nader Jalili as the next Dean of the Lyle School of Engineering effective March 1, 2023. Dr. Jalili joins SMU from the University of Alabama, where he has been Professor and Department Head in Mechanical Engineering since 2018.

Thank you to the members of the search committee, chaired by Sam Holland, Dean of the Meadows School of the Arts, for their service and to the Lyle School's community members for their diligent work to complete the search process this past fall. Thanks as well go to Paul Krueger who will continue to serve as Lyle's Dean *ad interim* until Nader's March 1 arrival.

Moody Hall Construction Well Underway

This week, Moody Dean Robin Poston hosted a walkthrough of SMU's new Frances Anne Moody Hall. Thanks to the generosity of the Moody Foundation and the great partnership between the Moody School leadership team and SMU's Office of Facilities Planning and Management, construction remains on schedule and should be completed by summer with a formal dedication in September. The picture below was taken during the tour from Moody Hall's balcony, which provides beautiful views of the northeast corner of SMU's main campus and is the first building located on the master-planned 10-acre property bounded by University Boulevard, Dublin Street, McFarlin Boulevard and Airline Road.



The 43,000 square-foot three-story building features an open core structure from the ground level up to the cupola, which allows natural lighting into the heart of the facility. The building has been designed to offer collaborative – as well as quiet – research and study spaces and includes a 170-person auditorium for dynamic lectures and events in addition to state-of-the-art classrooms.

Faculty and graduate students will enjoy a new reading room to facilitate study and a seminar room for meaningful instruction. Moody Fellows and SMU Scholars offices will be located in the new facility, as will conference rooms. Moody Hall will also house the Graduate and Research office suites.

The award seeks to honor and publicize the work of those individuals or institutions that have promoted cooperation between Spain and the United States, have contributed to improving reciprocal knowledge or have strengthened the relationship between the two countries.
