Work began with multiple kick-off meetings this week to review the survey's scope, process and timeline with a request to complete the survey by Friday, March 31. Road to R1/Scholarly and Creative Excellence

Request for proposal (RFP): SMU – Bush Institute post-doctoral program

In 2022, the Office of the Provost, in partnership with the George W. Bush Institute, <u>created a post-doctoral fellowship program</u> with the goals of encouraging collaborative research between SMU and the Bush Institute and increasing the number of post-doctoral fellows at SMU. We are happy to continue this program by funding three more post-doctoral positions for the 2023 academic year. Funding is limited to one year (12 months) per post-doctoral fellow, and preference will be given to proposals that are able to provide a second year of funding for the requested post-doctoral fellow and to proposals from Principal Investigators (PIs) at the rank of Assistant Professor.

All SMU tenured and tenure-track faculty are eligible to submit proposals and to serve as PI. All faculty, including teaching and professional (non-tenure track) full-time faculty, may serve as co-PI on proposals and awards. One proposal may be submitted per year per PI. There are no restrictions on the number of proposals on which a faculty member can serve as co-PI. Proposals must be submitted by April 14 to provost@smu.edu in 11-point or greater font and not exceeding two, 8.5. x 11 pages in length.

Research and Innovation Week, March 20-25

Research & Innovation Week is SMU's annual showcase and celebration of the outstanding research being done by SMU students and other members of our community. Events will include the Undergraduate Poster Session on March 21, the Graduate Poster Session on March 22, and the Master of Fine Arts Qualifying Exhibition on March 25. Additionally, this year's Research and Innovation Week will host two exciting events in Hughes-Trigg Student Center Auditorium:

Monday, March 20 is a keynote talk by Taylor Shead

Taylor Shead is the award-winning CEO and founder of STEMuli Studios and the 94th Black woman in history to raise over \$1 million in venture capital. Stephanie L. Knight, Dean of the Simmons School of Education and Human Development, will moderate the talk, which is titled "The Future of Dallas: Innovative Pathways to Technology for All." Refreshments will be available at 5:30 p.m., and the event will begin at 6 p.m.

Thursday, March 23, from 3:30-5 p.m., is a panel on "Graduate Education and the Future of Research in North Texas"

Representatives from our executive search firm, Isaacson Miller, also spent time this week meeting with members of both the Data Science Institute Advisory Board and the Data Science Cluster Hire Task Force, as well as with select faculty to inform the position description that will guide our search.

SMU researchers contributed to published Texas geothermal energy report

Dr. Mark Hand from Dedman College's department of Political Science and Maria Richards from the College's Roy M. Huffington department of Earth Sciences both contributed to "The Future of Geothermal in Texas Contemporary Prospects and Perspectives" report. This report has established the model that Project InnerSpace will use to study geothermal resources in Oklahoma, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah, West Virginia, Idaho, Nebraska, Arkansas, Montana, and Louisiana starting this semester.

Meadows professor inducted into the American Advertising Federation's Southwest Advertising Hall of Fame

Advertising professor Gordon Law, Executive in Residence in the Meadows School of the Arts' Temerlin Advertising Institute and Provost Faculty Fellow, has been inducted into the <u>American Advertising Federation's Southwest Advertising Hall of Fame</u>. The Southwest Hall of Fame encompasses Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Arkansas, and honors industry professionals who have distinguished themselves in their careers, contributed to the betterment of advertising and its reputation, and made volunteer efforts outside the workplace.

SMU chemistry professor awarded Wilkinson Prize for innovative software in scientific computing

Dr. Devin Matthews, Assistant Professor in Dedman College's department of Chemistry, has been awarded the 2023 <u>James H. Wilkinson Prize for Numerical Software</u>. This award is given by the <u>Society for Industrial and Applied Mathematics (SIAM)</u> every four years to recognize researchers in the early stages of their careers who have created an outstanding piece of numerical software, or to individuals who have made an outstanding contribution to an existing piece of numerical software. Matthews and his colleague Field G. Van Zee, researcher at UT Austin, will be awarded the prize later this month at the <u>2023 SIAM Conference on Computational Science and Engineering</u>, where Matthews will also be delivering the keynote address.

Cox faculty member honored with the Athena Leadership Award by the Dallas Regional Chamber

Dr. Candice Lucas-Bledsoe, director of the Action Research Center and SMU Cox research professor, was honored yesterday with the Athena Leadership Award by the Dallas Regional Chamber at their 25th Women's Business Conference. The Dallas Regional Chamber bestows this award upon "exceptional women who excel in their careers, contribute to their communities, and develop future leaders."
