Fall Executive Board meeting recaps

Meadows School of the Arts

On Tuesday, I joined President Turner and Sam Holland, Algur H. Meadows Dean, for the Meadows School of the Arts' 2023 Executive Board meeting. During my remarks, I reviewed SMU's undergraduate and graduate enrollment outcomes for fall 2023, updated board members on the 2024 *US News and World Report* rankings outcomes, and announced Neena Imam's appointment as the inaugural Peter O'Donnell, Jr. Director of the O'Donnell Data Science and Research Computing Institute.

Perkins School of Theology

October Faculty Senate meeting

During summer 2023, the Office of Engaged Learning and the O'Donnell Data Science and Research Computing Institute welcomed 12 students from across the country to participate in SMU's second annual "Data Science for Social Good" program. The program was funded by a National Science Foundation (NSF) "Research Experiences for Undergraduates" (REU) grant.

Students engaged in a two-week data science boot camp, formed teams to tackle research projects, and concluded their experience by competing in the "Three Minute Thesis" competition. Students of the program have been invited to present their work at the <u>Southern Demographic Association</u> annual meeting in San Antonio, October 18-20, 2023.

SMU celebrates 75 years of pro bono legal clinics in Dallas

Dedman School of Law celebrated the 75th anniversary of its law clinics this past week with various events throughout "Clinic Week," including a keynote lecture by the president of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) Deborah N. Archer. The law clinics provide legal services for those in our community who cannot afford a lawyer and provide law students with what is typically their first experience working with a client. Throughout this week, law students have been given hours of probono legal services under the supervision of their faculty supervisors.

Mary Spector, Associate Dean for Experiential Learning, and Jason P. Nance, Judge James Noel Dean of Dedman School of Law, have co-authored an <u>op-ed that was published in the Dallas Morning News</u> to commemorate Dedman Law's 75 years of offering clinics that generate experiential student learning outcomes and provide care for our community.

Road to R1: Research and Scholarly/Creative Excellence

Reminder: Call for proposals – University Research Council (URC) Travel and Research Grant

Proposals for the University Research Council's (URC) Research and Travel Grant Program for AY 2023 – 2024 are due by 5 p.m. on October 11, 2023. The URC will be accepting proposals from full-time research-active faculty, both tenure track and teaching/professional (non-tenure track), as well as faculty emeriti. Two proposals will be selected to receive grant funding. Travel grants may be awarded up to \$10,000 and research grants may be awarded up to \$15,000.

Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences anthropologist researches the roles climate and human land use play in Pacific Island wildfires past and present

Professor Christopher Roos from the Department of Anthropology in Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences has published his latest research in the journal <u>Nature Ecology and Evolution</u>, which shows that Fiji grassland fires predate human settlement by thousands of years and therefore climate is an undervalued part of the equation. While human-driven activity can result in wildfires, climate activity, such as lightning strikes can also be a key contributor.

Lyle School of Engineering faculty member working with transportation nonprofit Feonix Mobility Rising and other universities to research and improve health disparities in Dallas and Detroit

Professor Janille Smith-Colin from the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering in the Lyle School of Engineering is part of a team that has just received a \$6 million award from the <u>National Institutes of Health (NIH) ComPASS</u> program to improve health disparities in the major metropolitan areas of Dallas and Detroit.

Through this grant, led by non-profit Feonix - Mobility Rising, Smith-Colin and colleagues from Texas A&M, the University of Michigan and Michigan State University are investigating whether improved transportation in both cities can lead to better health outcomes for people with chronic medical conditions, especially women with high-risk pregnancies.

A new chapter for the Southwest Review (SwR)

The <u>Southwest Review</u>, SMU's quarterly literary magazine founded in 1915, is looking forward to ushering in a new chapter as they prepare for their centennial. Under the direction of Greg Brownderville, editor-in-chief of *Southwest Review* and professor in Dedman College of Humanities and Science's Department of English, the magazine will launch *Frontera*, an arts and cultural festival, in Dallas on April 12–13, 2024.

The festival will feature an international lineup – a hemisphere-spanning mix of U.S. and Latin American writers and artists – who have previously appeared in *Southwest Review*. On the evening of Saturday, April 13, *they will host* author Barry Gifford, a long-time contributor to the magazine, for

a screening of David Lynch's adaptation of his novel *Wild at Heart*. Additionally, the magazine is working with Gifford to publish a book featuring his art.

This is an exciting time for the *Southwest Review*, and I am grateful for its heritage and look forward to what the team will be able to accomplish in the years ahead.

Inclusive Excellence

National Book Award author and activist to speak at the SMU Gilbert Lecture Series

National Book Award author, mental health and LGBTQ+ activist, Andrew Solomon, will be speaking at October's installment of the Gilbert Lecture Series. Dr. Solomon is a professor of psychology at Columbia University Medical Center and former President of PEN American Center. His best-seller, Far from the Tree: Parents, Children, and the Search for Identity, won the National Book Critics Circle Award and has become a documentary film. His memoir, The Noonday Demon: An Atlas of Depression, won the National Book Award. Solomon holds a Ph.D. in Psychology from Cambridge University, an M.A. in English from Cambridge, and a B.A. from Yale. He writes regularly for The New York Times, The New Yorker, Travel & Leisure and many other publications.

The Gilbert Lecture Series October lecture will be held on Thursday, October 12, 2023, at McCord Auditorium in Dallas Hall. The event will start with a reception at 4:30 p.m. with the lecture and book signing to follow at 5 p.m.
