Spring 2024

Dean ad interim named for Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences

On April 9, I sent a message announcing Nathan Balke as the dean ad interim of Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences. Professor Balke, 2007 Dedman Family Distinguished Professor in the Department of Economics, has agreed to serve as dean ad interim effective June 1, 2024, until a permanent dean has been named. In my conversations with Dedman College constituents this spring to inform our search for a permanent dean, Nathan was a natural fit for the interim, and we are very grateful for his willingness to serve in this capacity. Please join me in welcoming Nathan on his assumption of the interim role.

As for the current search for the next permanent Elisabeth Martin Armstrong Dean of Dedman College, the search committee is scheduled to meet again on April 15, to review applications received to date and to discuss strategies for next steps.

Call for applications: Associate Vice Provost for Research

On April 10, <u>I sent a message</u> to faculty calling for nominations and applications for an associate vice provost for research (AVPR). The AVPR will work closely with the vice provost for research and chief innovation officer (VPR/CIO) and the Office of Research and Innovation (ORI) team on a variety of initiatives related to sponsored projects, research integrity, compliance, and technology transfer and

commercialization. They will support activities to promote research and grant writing, organize regular meetings with SMU's associate deans, and organize principal investigator meetings.

All SMU tenured faculty at the rank of professor who have demonstrated success in research and external funding are eligible to apply or be nominated. A complete application will include a cover letter describing relevant experiences and interest in the position; a current curriculum vitae; and the names of three references with titles, mailing addresses, business/home telephone numbers, and email addresses. Individuals who wish to nominate a candidate should submit a letter of nomination including the name, position, address, telephone number, and email address of the nominee. Applications and letters of nomination should be submitted to my office via e-mail to Daniel Eady (deady@smu.edu) no later than May 3, 2024.

SMU Townhall on Report from SMU Internationalization Steering Committee: April 24, 3 p.m.

The SMU Internationalization Steering Committee invites members of the SMU Community to a virtual townhall to review and give feedback on the Steering Committee's results, findings and recommendations after its careful study of SMU's current internationalization practices, those of our cohort and aspirational peer institutions and best practices in internationalization in higher education.

The townhall is planned for April 24, from 3–4:30 p.m. and will take place via Zoom. The draft internationalization report is available for review here. An executive summary is available here. After the townhall, the internationalization report will be revised and presented to SMU leadership.

The Center for Teaching Excellence has placed an open call for applications and nominations for the center's next director.

All full-time, benefits-eligible faculty are eligible to apply for the position or to be nominated. Applications should be submitted as a current CV and cover letter, while nominations should consist of a brief paragraph of endorsement. Finalists will be invited to an interview the week of May 6–10 with a start date of June 1 or July 1, 2024. Microsoft has expanded access to <u>Copilot</u>, an artificial intelligence assistant, to all Microsoft 365 for higher education users, making it available to SMU community members at no extra cost to the University. Copilot is a tool that <u>supports everyday business and work tasks</u> such as turning Microsoft Word documents into PowerPoint presentations, creating post-meeting action item lists, and summarizing long documents, email threads and meeting recordings. Call for applications: Faculty Research Acceleration Grant

The O'Donnell Data Science and Research Computing Institute (ODSRCI) is currently accepting applications for the Faculty Research Acceleration Grant.

Applying lead PIs must be faculty at SMU, although they can be from any field of study. The grant is intended to bolster research that incorporates large-scale data science, multimodal data, AI/ML

technologies, or implementation on SMU high-performance computing (HPC) platforms. All grants awarded will total up to \$100,000 for the year.

Proposal packets should be submitted by 5 p.m. on May 3, 2024, and include confidential letter(s) of support written by the department chair(s) along with a <u>completed proposal template</u>. Proposal packets should be submitted via email to Dr. Neena Imam at <u>nimam@smu.edu</u>.

Cox School of Business professor co-authors research revealing nature's impact on healthy food consumption decisions

Professor Maria Langlois, Department of Marketing at Cox School of Business, and her colleague Pierre Chandon, L'Oréal Chaired Professor of Marketing, INSEAD Business School – France, recently published their study, "Experiencing Nature Leads to Healthier Food Choices" in Communications Psychology. Through a series of five experiments, their research reveals that experiencing nature leads to healthier food choices when compared to experiencing urban environments or neutral environments (i.e., control condition).

The duo has also written a <u>"behind the paper" blog post on SpringerNature's Research Communities</u>, where they provide some high-level insights and discuss the inspiration behind their research.
