Testing is available by appointment to any SMU student or community member seeking academic credit for previous academic work. At SMU course credit is awarded when a student achieves a score of 60 points or above (out of 80 possible points).

# Road to R1: Research and Scholarly/Creative Excellence

## SMU researchers combine two therapeutic approaches to improve students' positive moods and ease negative moods

With depression rates rising among young people on university campuses, a team of SMU researchers, Alicia Meuret, professor and director of the Anxiety and Depression Research Center at SMU; Divya Kumar, former SMU doctoral student in clinical psychology and current postdoctoral fellow at Harvard/McLean Hospital; Sarah Corner, SMU doctoral student in clinical psychology; and Richard Kim, SMU data scientist, have been investigating effective treatments. The team found that combining two different therapeutic approaches demonstrated effectiveness in improving students' overall mental health. Combining behavioral activation therapy augmented with savoring helped students experience improvements in both positive and negative moods. Behavioral activation is a therapeutic approach that alleviates depression by increasing engagement in meaningful activities while savoring focuses on increasing one's capacity to cultivate enjoyable experiences.

Their study, entitled "A randomized controlled trial of brief behavioral activation plus savoring for positive affect dysregulation in university students," was published in the *Behavior Research and Therapy* journal.

### Moody Graduate School announces fellowship winners

The Moody School of Graduate and Advanced Studies' <u>Fellowships Office</u> would like to recognize SMU's recently-announced recipients of prestigious national and international fellowships.

#### **Fulbright Awards**

<u>Fulbright Scholarships</u> are funded by the U.S. Department of State to "expand perspectives through academic and professional advancement and cross-cultural dialogue." This year, two SMU graduate students were awarded prestigious Fulbright Research Scholarships, and one SMU graduate student was named an alternate for the Fulbright English Teaching Assistantship.

Jasmine Carty is a recent graduate of the M.S. in Counseling program at Simmons School of Education and Human Development and will use this award to conduct a research project titled "Identity Development, Migration, and Mental Health" through an affiliation with the University of Luxembourg.

Jennifer Laffick, an art history Ph.D. student at Meadows School of the Arts, received the Université Grenoble Alpes award to conduct research for her dissertation "Neoclassicism's Atlantic Currents: French Painting and Power in the Early 19<sup>th</sup> Century."

Austin Miller is a Ph.D. student in the William P. Clements Department of History at Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences and was named an alternate for the Fulbright English Teaching Assistantship in Norway.

#### NSF-Graduate Research Fellowship

The NSF Graduate Research Fellowship Program (NSF-GRFP) is a highly competitive national program that aims to ensure the quality, vitality, and diversity of the United States' scientific and engineering workforce. The five-year fellowship program's goal is to broaden the participation of the full spectrum of diverse talents in STEM by providing three years of financial support.

This year, Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences' Department of Anthropology Ph.D. student and Moody Graduate Fellow, Erik Schlicht, was awarded the NSF-GRFP for his research on the relationship between land use and wildfires in the American West.

#### Philanthropic Educational Organization (PEO) Scholar Award

The <u>PEO Scholar Awards</u> were established in 1991 to provide substantial merit-based awards for women in the U.S. and Canada pursuing a doctoral degree.

Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences' Department of Anthropology Ph.D. student Nicolette Edwards was awarded a PEO Scholar Award to complete her dissertation "Investigating Women's Provisioning Efforts in the Ethnoarchaeological Record of Central African Forest Foragers."

#### PEO International Peace Scholarships

The PEO International Peace Scholarship was established in 1949 to provide scholarships for women from other countries to pursue graduate studies in the U.S. International Peace Scholarship recipients carry the spirit of PEO back to their home countries where the degrees they have earned will positively impact lives around the globe. This year, two SMU international graduate students received this award.

Linda Mishell Jaramillo Urrega is a Ph.D. student in the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering at Lyle School of Engineering and was awarded an International Peace Scholarship to support her research on using knowledge-based community engagement to assist women in artisanal mining communities in Colombia with a focus on environmental priorities.

Yang Liu, a Ph.D. student in the Department of Anthropology at Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences, was awarded an International Peace Scholarship to support her medical and psychological anthropology research on post-partum depression in urban China.

### Second AAPI Voices in Higher Education Annual Symposium held at SMU

The Dedman College Interdisciplinary Institute's (DCII) Asian Studies and Asian American Experiences Research Cluster organized the second Asian, Asian American, and Pacific Islander Voices in Higher Education Annual Symposium on April 16, 2024, on SMU's main campus. The event was led by Professor Piyawan Charoensap-Kelly from the Division of Corporate Communication and Public Affairs at Meadows School of the Arts, Professor LaiYee Leong from the Department of Political Science at Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences, and Rachel Ball-Phillips Ph.D., director of graduate fellowships and awards at the Moody School of Graduate and Advanced Studies.

The symposium brought together an interdisciplinary group of scholars nationwide to discuss this year's theme: community building and resilience. During the event, participants discussed current issues and new research findings pertinent to the AAPI community in higher education to promote inclusion, empowerment, and solidarity among AAPI individuals and their allies. This event was part of the AAPI Heritage Month celebration at SMU, attracting over 130 faculty, staff, and students from SMU and nearby colleges and community members from the DFW area. Attendees provided highly positive feedback during and after the event with recurring comments, such as "thought-provoking," "informative," "inspiring," and that the event "created solidarity on our campus and the greater North Texas community."

The symposium was made possible through the generous support of DCII, the Office of Diversity and Inclusion (ODI), the Asian Studies Program, the Center for Teaching Excellence, and the Women and LGBT Center. ### DCII hosted Energy, Environment, and Natural Resources Colloquium

Monika Ehrman, professor at Dedman School of Law; Alex Chase, assistant professor in the Roy M. Huffington Department of Earth Sciences at Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences; James Coleman, professor at Dedman School of Law; and Chris Hill, adjunct professor at Lyle School of Engineering, co-chaired the <a href="MU Energy">SMU Energy</a>, Environment, and Natural Resources Colloquium on May 3, 2024, in Frances Anne Moody Hall. This day-long event brought together a dynamic blend of experts from law, engineering, earth sciences, humanities, and business fields to discuss pressing issues in environmental justice, sustainable technologies, natural resource investigation and management.

Generously sponsored by the DCII, the Colloquium was the final event in the DCII's Big Challenge Series, which focused on climate resilience and united two DCII Research Clusters, "Energy & Environmental Systems" and "Subsurface Resources," primarily led by Monika Ehrman and Alex Chase. This colloquium was a focal point for interdisciplinary collaboration, attracting 70 professionals, academics, and students interested in the complexities involved in energy production, natural sciences, resource management, environmental justice and policy. The event concluded with a series of lightning round presentations by graduate students from Lyle School of Engineering, Dedman School of Law, and Dedman College's Roy M. Huffington Department of Earth Sciences, showcasing their research on topics ranging from methane detection to the socio-economic impacts of resource extraction.
