CRAIG C. HILL

Craig C. Hill is dean and professor of New Testament at SMU's Perkins School of Theology and is an ordained elder in the United Methodist Church. He served for a decade in various pastoral appointments, including the chaplaincy of Christ Church, John Wesley's undergraduate Oxford college. He is a graduate of Illinois Wesleyan University, Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary and the University of Oxford, where he completed his doctorate in New Testament History. Hill also served as a Fellow of Yale University and a Visiting Fellow of the University of Cambridge. His publications include *Hellenists and Hebrews: Reappraising Division within the Earliest Church*, *In God's Time: The Bible and the Future*, the Romans portion of *The Oxford Bible Commentary*, and *Servant of All: Status, Ambition, and the Way of Jesus*.

Dr. Hill came to Perkins from Duke University Divinity School, where he was Professor of Theological Pedagogy. Prior to that, he was Professor of New Testament at Wesley Theological Seminary, where he also held a variety of administrative posts, including directing the Wesley Ministry Network project.

THE SMU MCKENZIE BIBLE

The McKenzie Bible was printed in 1856 and once was the property of J.W.P. McKenzie, a pioneer in Methodist education in Texas. It was used continually by McKenzie, who established McKenzie College at Clarksville, once the largest institution of higher learning in Texas. This historic Bible was presented to SMU in 1916 by Mrs. Milton Ragsdale of Dallas, a niece of McKenzie.

The McKenzie Bible was first used at SMU's 1916 Commencement Convocation, and the University is proud to use it at tonight's Baccalaureate Service.
