

Getting Ready for AARO

y the time you attend AARO, your advisor already knows your name. You are enrolled in your advisor's Blackboard "class," and you may have already met him or her electronically. Now you will meet face to face. Your advisor will help you learn to navigate the channels of higher education. Your skills and desires and his or her knowledge of University requirements will come together as you craft an SMU education plan as unique as your character. Before you meet your advisor, it's a good idea to review your Owner's Manual and to study the University Catalog. After all, you want to be in the driver's seat as you plan. In order to determine which courses you want to take and which course levels will best suit your skills, you may take academic placement tests during your time at AARO. You will also want to discover the many helpful resources on campus – tutoring, career planning, health center, clubs and interest groups, programs, and study abroad options – so you'll be ready to take command of your opportunities when your school year begins.

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When Do I Attend AARO?

FIRST YEAR AND FIRST YEAR-TRANSFER

ach of the 10 AARO sessions will accommodate approximately 130 new students and their family members. All new students are required to stay overnight in Boaz Hall. Staying on campus provides an opportunity to experience residence hall living at SMU and to interact with the AARO leaders also living in Boaz Hall. Breakfast, lunch and dinner will be provided on the first day and breakfast and lunch on the second day. Students who arrive late or on an incorrect AARO date cannot be accommodated. Please make travel plans so that you arrive on campus by 8:00 a.m. on the first day of AARO and plan to stay until 5:00 p.m. on the second day.

Transfer AARO is a half-day orientation program for students with 30 or more transferable hours who will be enrolling in Fall 2009. Programs provide academic requirements and expectations, campus resources, involvement opportunities and the chance to meet current students. During your AARO session, you will also meet one-on-one with an academic advisor and register for fall classes. Check-in for AARO will begin at 8:00 a.m. on the main level of the Hughes-Trigg Student Center.

You cannot be advised or register for classes until your admission deposit is paid, and your final transcript from previous colleges and universities has been received and processed by the Division of Enrollment Services. This process takes a minimum of two weeks.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

All students studying in secondary schools outside the United States, including U.S. citizens, are encouraged to attend the two-day International AARO on August 17-18. If you are unable to attend the International AARO, you may select any of the July sessions that is conducive to your travel arrangements. All students who attend the two-day International AARO will be required to attend Mustang Corral August 21-23.

We encourage all family members to attend your student's AARO session. In addition to attending academic and resource sessions with your students, we have planned a panel discussion specifically for parents and families.

Student Accommodations

ARO residence hall rooms are airconditioned and feature two twin beds per room, with linens provided. Each student will be assigned a roommate and will share community bath facilities. All SMU facilities are nonsmoking.

If you will need on-campus housing the night before or after your confirmed AARO date, you must mark this preference on the online reservation form. Extra housing is limited to one night before or one night after the confirmed AARO date. There is a \$25 fee for the additional night of housing. Participants arriving and staying on campus the night before their session must check in at the McElvaney Hall desk. Luggage storage is available. There will be a fee of \$45 for lost room keys.



When You Arrive

When you arrive at SMU for AARO, please park in the Binkley Garage on level two or above. Enter the garage through the visitor lane from Binkley Avenue. Enter the access code 1092 on the keypad to gain entry to the garage. It will not be necessary to take a visitor's entry ticket when using the keypad. Upon exit use the visitor lane keypad to enter the access code 1092. You do not need to use the pay station to exit. You will receive a parking pass in early June that you will need to display on your rearview mirror during AARO.

Report to Boaz Hall to get your AARO room assignment. (All students attending AARO are required to stay in Boaz Hall in order to participate in all the planned activities.) Residence Life and Student Housing staff will be on-hand from 8:00-8:45 a.m. to assist you in this process. You will receive your room key, access card, and a campus map at this time. From Boaz Hall you will proceed to the **Hughes-Trigg Student Center for** AARO Check-In. Please allow yourself time for a 5 minute walk from Boaz to Hughes-Trigg. AARO Check-In will take place from 8:15-9:00 a.m. You will receive a nametag and all AARO session materials at that time.










MU has negotiated with American Airlines, the official carrier for participants of AARO and Mustang Corral, to help you secure the least expensive fare to Dallas. American is offering discounted fares valid for travel within the United States. The special rates are available only through the American Airlines Meeting Services Desk at 1-800-433-1790 for individual reservations. You must indicate that you are attending Southern Methodist University Orientation and ask specifically for discount code A1179SS. Meeting Services will confirm the lowest applicable fare, providing tariff rules are met. Fare contracted is base fare only. Any applicable taxes, fees, and charges are the responsibility of the passenger.

GROUND TRANSPORTATION IN DALLAS

Several methods of transportation are available from D/FW Airport or Love Field to the SMU campus and selected hotels.

Super Shuttle

Offers transportation to and from D/FW Airport for \$28.00 one way for the first passenger and \$8.00 for the second and third

ational studies indicate college students who work part time find it beneficial in supplementing finances, acclimating to campus, and learning skills such as time management. SMU offers students a variety of resources to locate work opportunities on and off campus.

To comply with the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, all students must complete the I-9 process in order to have part-time employment at SMU. This process can be completed through Human Resources, second floor, Expressway Tower Building, any time before the start of employment. See the Student Employment website for necessary documents.





Testing for Placement and Credit

FOREIGN LANGUAGE PLACEMENT EXAM

tudents who have had at least two years of language instruction in high school within the past two years, or who have acquired language skills in some other manner, are required to take a language placement examination if they wish to continue their language study at SMU.

If the period of time which has elapsed since the language was studied is longer than two years students must still take a placement exam if they wish to take any course above the beginning level.

Students who have taken an AP exam (score of 4 or 5) in their language of study are exempted from this requirement. SMU does not accept any Foreign Language CLEP exams for credit or placement.

Native speakers educated in their native language may be exempted from the placement exam. Students should contact the area chair in their language of interest.

Language Exams Offered

Online placement exams are offered in all languages taught at SMU (Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Latin, Spanish & Russian) with the exception of Hindi which is a paper exam. Students wishing to take a Hindi exam should contact Elise Pflum at eapflum@smu.edu.

Retroactive Credit

By taking a placement exam students have the opportunity to receive retroactive credit for beginning and intermediate courses in their language of study. Once students have completed the course into which they were placed with a grade of C or higher, they may request the retroactive credit earned (maximum of 16 credits depending on the language of study).

Payment

The placement exam fee is not included in any AARO fees, nor can it be bundled with any AARO or SMU payments. **The fee for the placement exam is \$40**, payable only before the exam and only from the FLL website. Please note that after credit card information for payment is entered, students must take the test immediately and cannot postpone it to a later time. To take the test at a later date, students would need to pay the \$40 fee again.

Online exams must be paid with a debit or credit card and a local address must be entered when asked for a billing address. The Hindi exam may be paid with \$40 cash or a check made out to SMU.

Students who do not have access to a debit/credit card or who would prefer to pay via check or cash should arrange to take their exam in the FLTTC by e-mailing eapflum@smu.edu at least a week in advance.

Timing of Exam

Incoming students must take any online language exam(s) prior to attending AARO.

Advisors cannot register students for ANY language classes if he/she needs to have taken a placement exam but has not.

The online placement exam may be taken online at any time and from any location. The exam results do not expire, although it is suggested that students register for language classes within a reasonable time after taking the placement exam so that the testing results reflect the student's current knowledge of the language.

There is no time limit on the exam. The exam generally takes less than one hour. Please contact Rebecca Marin at 214-768-4557 if you have questions regarding services for students with disabilities.



Exam Access

Students do not need an SMU ID to take the placement exam. Students will register for the exam by creating an account. This user name and password are not related to any SMU passwords students may have been provided or previously created.

Additional Information

Although some students review for the exam, it is to a student's advantage to have the exam reflect their current knowledge of the language. **Students should remember to PRINT their score report** or save to .pdf before exiting the exam. They will need to provide this documentation to their advisor for registration.

MATH

Six tests are offered during AARO:

- Math 1303 &1304 pre-calculus: for placement only, no credit
- Math 1307,1309, 1337 & 1338: for credit

Fee: \$20; exact cash or check only. The math exams are at 2:30 p.m. on the first day of your AARO session. Report with \$20 exam fee to Room 208 Clements Hall.

Which test should I take? See below; also see www.smu.edu/math/placement. The mathematics department encourages students that have taken a strong precalculus course to take the placement exam so they do not have to repeat precalculus. Students that have taken calculus in high school can go directly into calculus without taking a placement exam, or they can receive credit for calculus by passing the appropriate credit exam. All mathematics credit exams must be taken before the first day of classes.

No calculators are allowed except for **Math 1307**, for which a calculator is required. Students who will need extra time on the placement/credit exam may request that at the door upon entering the exam. Students who need other accommodations for a disability must first contact Ms. Rebecca Marin, Director, Services for Students with Disabilities (214-768-4557) to verify disability and establish eligibility for accommodation.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

One credit exam for **CSE 1340: Introduction to Computer Concepts** is available during AARO. This exam is for students with Java programming experience who did not earn credit through an AP exam. This is NOT the Information Technology Exam.

Fee: \$20, exact cash only.

Tuition and Fees

hen you complete your course registration at AARO, the Division of Enrollment Services will send you a summary of your charges to your SMU email account. The charges will represent the cost of the hours in which you have enrolled, room and board, and selected Essential Services. If you are attending AARO in July or early August your Fall term payment for the full amount of charges must be received by the Division of Enrollment Services no later than August 5. Students whose accounts are not cleared

by the deadline are charged a late payment fee of \$150 for balances between \$1,000-\$7,500. Balances over \$7,500 are charged 2% of the outstanding balance not to exceed \$500. After one month, all past due balances are charge 1.5% of the balance due. AARO participants attending Summer School will need to pay their summer session charges at the time of enrollment. 

ACCESS.SMU

CCESS.SMU is the self-service system in which students enroll/drop classes, view the schedule of classes, view grades, view and request transcripts and degree progress reports, view financial aid and student account information, and update/verify personal information -addresses, phone/cell numbers, emergency contact and demographic summary.

Students have the final responsibility for the accuracy of their enrollment, the applicability of their courses towards their degree requirements and their academic performance. Please be sure to check your SMU email account regularly. The University uses the student's email account as the official means of communication for notification of deadlines and other important announcements. Please review the Registrar's Home Page (smu.edu/registrar/) for more detailed information.

SMU Email Account

s part of your admissions to SMU, you are given an SMU email account for your use. All official SMU communication is directed through the SMU email account. It is very important that you check this account regularly for important information regarding registration, University events and emergency notification. To access your email, go to webmail. smu.edu.

Login using your SMU ID number and the same password used for logging in to Access.SMU. For additional information about SMU email or other technology services, please visit smu.edu/help.

Reserve Your PO Box

f you live on campus during the academic year, you are required to have a post office box at the SMU Post Office. You may register for a post office box during AARO or beginning June 18 register online at **smu.edu/pobox** to avoid lines. Beginning July 31st, you may also register at the SMU Post Office, located on the main floor of the Hughes-Trigg Student Center. This PO Box number will be entered into your records at the time of registration and will be your official campus mailing address. The non-refundable \$75 annual mailbox fee is charged to the student account along with the Fall term residence hall rent charge. Nonresident (commuter) students may rent a mailbox at the SMU Post Office for a \$75 fee. Payment will be accepted in the form of SMU Expre\$\$ Cash, Visa/MasterCard, or a personal check payable to PBMS (Pitney Bowes Management Service).



Textbooks

e urge you to take advantage of the SMU Bookstore's Textbook Reservation Program on our website at http://smu.bncollege.com immediately after registration at AARO. The greatest amount of discounted used books is available through the reservation program. We recommend you select your reservation be picked up in the store when you return to campus to begin classes, but you may also have your books shipped to your home for a nominal fee. You may also purchase your textbooks at AARO, but we will be in the process of receiving many of our fall textbooks, and may not have all of your books in stock. If you do choose this option, you will need to take your books with you; there is no on-campus storage for purchases.

The SMU Bookstore is located in the Park Cities Plaza Shopping Center, 3060 Mockingbird Lane (next to La Madeleine). Textbook purchases for a full course load will range from \$600 to \$800, depending on your courses. The bookstore will be open Monday-Friday 8:00 a.m to 9 p.m., Saturday 10 a.m. to 9:00 p.m and Sunday 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Services for Students with Disabilities

he mission of the office of Services for Students with Disabilities is to support the educational, career, social, and recreational choices of SMU students with documented disabilities through coordination of services and reasonable accommodations. It is the responsibility of the students themselves to establish eligibility for services or accommodations through the office of Services for Students with Disabilities. Students who would like to be considered for services through this office (1) must submit appropriate, current documentation, see website for documentation guidelines, and (2) must request services themselves, by phone or letter. In their requests, students should indicate what assistance is being sought, and provide information on how to be contacted after the documentation is reviewed.

Documentation will not be reviewed without the students' making such a request.

Documentation of a disability needs time to be reviewed to determine eligibility, so it's important to submit documentation early.

NOTE: Since submitting documentation to admissions is not considered a request for services and does not ensure that the documentation is forwarded to this

office, be sure to submit documentation directly to this office. Please allow two weeks for review of documentation before inquiring about eligibility for services.

Release of Education Records & FERPA

Health Center Requirements

our acceptance packet from the Division of Enrollment Services included a Medical Health History Form that must be completed. A physical examination is not required, but immunizations documented by your physician are required. A copy of your immunizations records from your previous school or clinic official records may be attached to the medical form. Please submit these medical forms directly to SMU Memorial Health Center (not Enrollment Services). This must be on file with SMU's Health Center before you can register for classes.

If you still need the required or recommended immunizations, the Health Center can administer the following vaccines or test for a fee: Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR), Tuberculosis (TB) skin test, Diphtheria, Tetanus (DT), or Diphtheria, Pertussis, Tetanus (DPT), Meningococcal, Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B and HPV.

To obtain another copy of the Medical Health History form or to inquire about vaccine prices, please visit the Health Center website. www.smu.edu/healthcenter

In order to ensure that students have appropriate health care coverage, SMU requires its students to maintain insurance as a condition of enrollment. All domestic students taking at least nine credit hours are required to enroll in the SMU Student Insurance if proof of comparable U.S. health coverage is not provided. It is mandatory that all International Students attending SMU enroll in the University Student Health Insurance Plan at www.ahpcare.com/smu.

Academic Honesty Tutorial

MU has a deep commitment to maintaining high standards of academic integrity among the student body. All entering students in the Fall 2009 class are required to read an online tutorial on academic honesty and then take an online quiz. This is accessed through Blackboard, the University's Course Management System. All entering students can log onto Blackboard using their SMU ID number as user name and the password they have been given for Access.SMU. Visit http://courses.smu.edu/honesty.

When a student has successfully completed the quiz, this information becomes available to advisors and the student's academic record reflects this. The tutorial and quiz may be taken as many times as needed. All new students – both first-year and transfer – are expected to complete this tutorial and quiz prior to fall registration. There will be consequences for students who do not successfully complete the tutorial.
