### DISSERTATION

#### DESIRE SATISFACTION THEORIES AND THE PROBLEM OF DEPRESSION

I argue that desire satisfaction theories of well-being have a difficult time explaining the badness of being clinically depressed. Such theories say that a person is well-off to the extent that they are getting what they want. People with clinical depression want very few things, but are getting them. After clarifying the problem, I consider a number of possible responses, and, for each response, argue that it either fails outright, or requires modifications to the desire satisfaction theory which make the theory unattractive for other reasons.
